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DODGING THE POTHOLES . . .

When we first moved to Grand Rapids, MI in February of 1995, I quickly became aware of the conditions of the roads with potholes galore – side streets, main streets, interstates. I wasn't use to this as New York State had roads in good condition. Take your eyes off the road for a second and wham! And I'm not talking about little holes either. One had to watch one's speed, stay alert, be ready to swerve or brake. Cars regularly underwent front wheel alignment and others experienced blown tires. In this part of the country winter weather of cold and snow seasonally claimed the roads. In time the roads began being repaired. But still dodging the potholes was a regular exercise.

My mother died in early February of 2000 and the following year her second husband, Chick Sutton, died in early February of 2001. Chick was age 90 when he died. Just prior to his death he suddenly fell and broke his hip. You could say that fracturing the hip was a sudden pothole for him. Down he went and pop went the hip. His recovery was short lived. Perhaps in his own way he decided he didn't need to dodge any more potholes in life. Ninety years of doing this was enough.

Now living in Florida, the potholes are much less as the climate is more merciful to road conditions. But still there remain the potholes in life. Some we notice in time. Others quickly surprise us. My carotid artery surgery just prior to Christmas was one of those surprise potholes that with the grace of God and medicine I dodged. Life will be smooth sailing for a while and then something jars the journey. I reflect back to the late 1970's when Judy and I were discussing with friends of our age how lucky we were so far with having our parents alive and well. Our friends said, "Some day the bubble will break." Shortly thereafter Judy's mom died and two months later my dad died.

Dodging the potholes. Some we can. Some we cannot. Some are just a little jolt to our systems. Others are massive when they hit. Yet, we are not to shy away from life because of potholes. Julian of Norwich, the 14th century English mystic, puts it this way: "Sometimes we experience such darkness that we lose all our energy. But our intent in life is to continue to live in God and faithfully trust that we will be shown compassion and grace. This is God's own working in us. Out of the goodness of God the eye of our understanding is opened by which we see, sometimes more and sometimes less, according to the ability we are given to receive."

Dodging the potholes. Driving in Grand Rapids was an art form. Driving in Florida is much more relaxing, but still staying alert. But the real art in life is not so much trying to dodge the potholes as to be in company with the One who will not lose us to them. Florence Converse in *House of Prayer* writes: "How can you hope to make the imperfect things perfect, unless you keep before your eyes the vision of God, who is perfection? The prayer that is only against evil destroys itself. If you look at nothing but sorrow and sin, your heart may be at first full of love and pity, but presently anger – righteous perhaps – but still anger – will enter and begin to crowd out love; and then despair will come and deaden pity, and at last will even smother righteous anger. And then there will be silence; for the heart that is filled with despair cannot pray. Christ is part of all the poverty and misery because He was born into it and didn't try to get away from it. If you put him in the background and in the front with all the darkness all around Him, how He shines and makes courage and hope!"

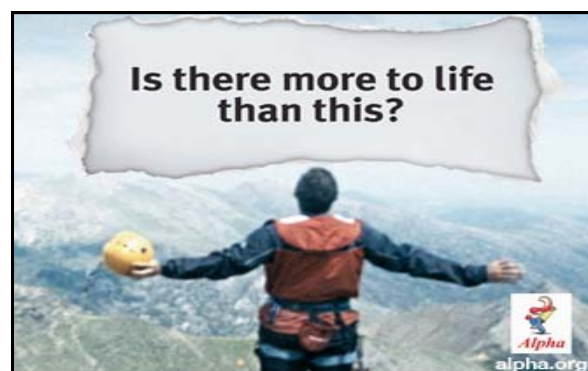

Ministry of the Month

July: Altar Guild

As the Episcopal Church has known them, altar guilds developed in the late 19th century, a natural outgrowth of what had been an exclusively male world. For hundreds of years certain male leaders called clerics, then sacristans, were responsible for everything that is now considered "altar guild work." A sacristan supervised the sacristy and all the paraphernalia of worship, prepared for services and did the church housekeeping as well. Sometime in the 19th century women became assistants to sacristans and by the turn of the 20th century they were beginning to organize into guilds. Although women have predominated, by the end of the 20th century men were again taking part in this ministry. Today at SOTH we have Brother David and several husbands who help set up for a service but are not officially on a team.

Altar guild work goes on quietly behind the scenes and often goes unnoticed because worshipers don't think about the familiar scene in front of them as long as it remains familiar. Altar guild members are willing to give as much time as it takes to do what has to be done. This includes cleaning, polishing silver and brass, setting up for a service, cleansing after and washing and ironing the linens. They also help with weddings and funerals.

We have four teams at SOTH each taking one week of each month plus one extra week during the year. August: Health and Wellness

The **HEALTH AND WELLNESS MINISTRY**, commissioned in April 2001, is led by Parish Nurse Sylvia Giffune under the direction of the Parish Health and Wellness Team.

Services offered include:

Health screening including blood pressure screening on the fourth Sunday of each month after each service

Education—monthly newsletter articles, quarterly seminars on pertinent subjects and other programs as requested

Assistance with referrals—helping parishioners identify and obtain the services they need

Listening and health counseling on an individual basis

Training volunteers—preparing and coordinating the group of parishioners who provide auxiliary services

Home and hospital visits—determining needs and facilitating planning.

We provide prepared food in emergencies for those who live alone or when the homemaker/cook is ill. Foods donated should be labeled with contents, date of preparation/freezing and any special notation such as "no salt added". Please call Sylvia Giffune if you have a need for or would like to donate prepared food.

We also maintain a lending closet of home health needs such as wheelchairs, crutches, walkers, bath stools, commodes, etc for short-term loan.

HEART ATTACK WARNING SIGNS:

Some heart attacks are sudden and intense, but most of them start slowly, with mild pain and discomfort. Here are signs that can mean a heart attack is happening:

Chest discomfort. Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or that goes away and comes back. It can feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.

Discomfort in other areas of the upper body.

Symptoms can include pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.

Shortness of Breath. This feeling often comes along with chest discomfort. But it can occur with or without chest discomfort.

Other signs. These may include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or light headedness.

If you or someone you're with has one or more of these signs, call 9-1-1...get to the hospital right away.

If you're the one having symptoms, and you can't access the emergency medical service (EMS), have someone drive you to the hospital right away. **Don't drive yourself**, unless you have absolutely no other option.

STROKE WARNING SIGNS

Stroke is a medical emergency. Every second counts. Because time lost is brain lost !!!

Know these stroke warning signs and teach them to others.

Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm or leg especially on one side of the body.

Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding.

Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes.

Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination.

Sudden, severe headache with no known cause.

If you or someone with you has one or more of these signs, don't delay! Immediately call 9-1-1 or the emergency medical services (EMS) number so an ambulance –ideally with advanced life support- can be sent for you. Also, check the time so you'll know when the first symptoms appeared. It's very important to take immediate action. Within three hours of the start of symptoms, a clot-busting drug can reduce long-term disability for the most common type of stroke.

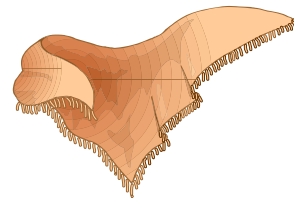
The ECW is a national Episcopal organization for women with chapters in local churches. We are involved in a variety of activities in the life of Shepherd of the Hills.

Christian Formation

Breath and the Spiritual Life

Hindus believe that a life force exists which they have named 'prana.' This universal force is the source of all creative activity and the basis of internal peace. It is God's energy, if you will, and it leads to all that is good in the world.

Prana is available to everyone and can be accessed through the breath. Hence breath control (pranayama) is central to Hindu spiritual practice. Sound farfetched? Not if we take scripture seriously. Genesis (2:7) tells us that God created man (Adam) from the dust of the ground and "breathed into his nostrils the breath of life and he became a "living being (soul)."

More fascinating yet is what language experts tell us: The Hebrew word for breath and spirit are one and the same (ruah). Hence it can be said that God spirited into Adam, thereby giving him life.

Then there is the Pentecost lesson from Ezekiel 37:1-14. The valley, it seems, is filled with dry bones. No life; no creativity until the Lord says "I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live."

As the dry bones begin to awaken (a key word in meditation), sinews, flesh and skin appear. Yet there is no breath. Then the Lord God instructs Ezekiel to "prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord God: come from the four winds, O breath, and breath upon these slain, that they may live."

God's message to the house of Israel? 'I am placing my spirit within you and bringing you back to life. There is hope once again!'

Remarkable as these scriptures are, there is an even more astounding one. It is found in John, chapter 20. Here the disciples have gathered together. Fear abounds. They are associated with Jesus and he has

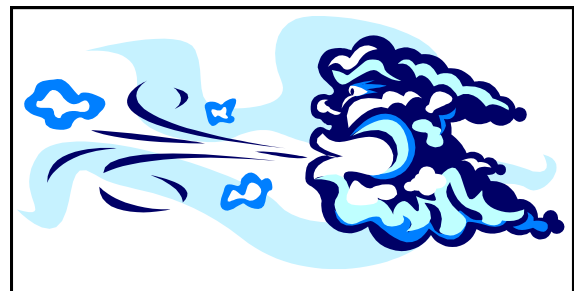
died the death of a common criminal. What will happen to them?

Then, though the doors were shut (and presumably locked), Jesus stands in their midst and bestows upon them what the church has called the 'great commission.' "As the father has sent me, so also I send you," Jesus says. John continues, "When he said this, he breathed on them and said, receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you shall forgive, they are forgiven them..."

I find it fascinating that Jesus used his breath to convey the Holy Spirit. Certainly he could have simply declared his intention verbally or he could have laid hands on his disciples as he did during countless acts of healing during his active ministry. No, he breathed on them thereby conveying what thus far has not been claimed by the church: There is spiritual power in the breath.

The question remains, how's your breath? Do you see the breath as a means of accessing the spirit? Is focusing on your breath a part of your meditation practice? Do you imagine that God is breathing in to you and giving you life? How can the church claim this form of spiritual practice? Could the breath awaken the dry bones of the church and simultaneously give us a means of crossing the boundaries between east and west?

Liturgical Notes...

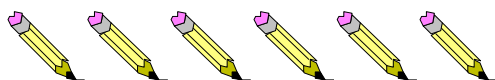

General Convention 2009

**convenes July 8 – 17
in Anaheim, California**

General Convention of the Episcopal Church in the United States is its primary governing and legislative body. It is held every three years. It is comprised of two houses – the House of Bishops, made up of all the bishops of the U.S. dioceses (approximately 200) and the House of Deputies, consisting of up to four laity and four clergy representatives from each diocese (700 clergy/lay elected from within each of the 110 dioceses). In addition there will be media and ministry representatives and observers from around the world.

Resolutions must be passed by both houses for approval. In the House of Deputies clergy and lay delegates vote separately.

Our Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori presides in the House of Bishops and Bonnie Anderson presides in the House of Deputies as its president. When both houses meet in joint session, the Presiding Bishop presides.

In recent years General Convention has come together around a theme that to some extent expresses the energies of the church during this period of history. In a church that celebrates so many diverse ideals, cultures, languages and theological perspectives, finding a theme that captures the prevailing mood is difficult. The 2009 theme is “ubuntu” – a Zulu Xhosa word that is often translated: “I am because we are.”

While General Convention is meeting so also does Triennial, the meeting of the Episcopal Women of the Episcopal Church.

The daily Media Hub will feature video stream, flicker photos, legislative news, twitter feed and other resources. Go to the Episcopal Church website (www.episcopalchurch.org) and you will find this daily, to the minute resource available to keep you up to date on the wide range of events, briefings, hearings, and discussions taking place in both houses and joint committees.

With General Convention meeting this July I draw our attention to what the Prayer Book Catechism says about the Church:

The Church is the community of the New Covenant.

In the Bible the Church is described as the Body of which Jesus Christ is the Head and of which all baptized persons are members. It is called the People of God, the New Israel, a holy nation, a royal priesthood, and the pillar and ground of truth.

The creeds describe the Church as one, holy, catholic, and apostolic.

The Church is one because it is one Body, under one Head, our Lord Jesus Christ. It is holy because the Holy Spirit dwells in it, consecrates its members, and guides them to do God's work. It is catholic because it proclaims the whole Faith to all people, to the end of time. It is apostolic because it continues in the teaching and fellowship of the apostles and is sent to carry out Christ's mission to all people.

The mission of the Church is to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ.

The Church pursues its mission as it prays and worships, proclaims the Gospel, and promotes justice, peace, and love.

The Church carries out its mission through the ministry of all its members.

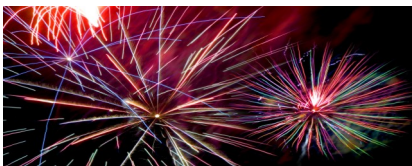
